Dear Parish Family,

As we celebrate Trinity Sunday this weekend, we give thanks and praise to our God who is Father, Son and Holy Spirit. While this mystery is beyond our comprehension, we are able to understand this in some fashion through the attributes of each of the “persons” within the Godhead. We reflect upon the merciful and loving Father Who always longs for us His beloved children; Jesus, our brother who redeems us by becoming human and showing us how to live and sacrificing Himself for us; and the Holy Spirit who guides us to all truth and right living. More than just reflecting on the Trinity, however, we are called to live in the image of the Trinity, in whose likeness we have been created. There are many examples of doing this, but as this is also Father’s Day, let us focus on how a Christian father does this well.

The Christian father is called through his vocation to marriage and family life to be a spiritual leader of his household, in the same way that Christ is head of His bride the Church. This means that the father is called to “lay down his life” for his wife and children in the same way Christ laid down His life for us all. How does a father lay down his life? He does so when his own interests take a back seat to those of his wife and children. He does so when he sacrifices something he wants to help provide for his family. He does so when he spends time continuing to cultivate and deepen the bond of love with his wife. He does so when he spends time with his children – teaching them, playing with them, and simply being a positive role model. Sometimes, he does so by appropriately disciplining his children and setting rules and boundaries that he knows are right even when this will cause his children some temporary unhappiness.

When we witness Christian fathers doing these things, we see the image of the Trinity’s love for us manifest in them. On this Father’s Day, we thank all Christian fathers for their sacrifices of love that continue to help us to draw closer to that indwelling Trinity that wants to share life with us now and into eternity. Let us pray that more fathers will accept this responsibility as spiritual leader, to draw their families closer to the Lord, and truly promote the unity of the Christian family in our society to be an image of the Trinity’s presence in our world.

The Gospel of Life...

St. John Paul II writes in *Evangelium Vitae*: “The Second Vatican Council, in a passage which retains all its relevance today, forcefully condemned a number of crimes and attacks against human life. Thirty years later, taking up the words of the Council and with the same forcefulness, I repeat that condemnation in the name of the whole Church, certain that I am interpreting the genuine sentiment of every upright conscience: “Whatever is opposed to life itself, such as any type of murder, genocide, abortion, euthanasia, or willful self-destruction, whatever violates the integrity of the human person, such as mutilation, torments inflicted on body or mind, attempts to coerce the will itself; **whatever insults human dignity, such as subhuman living conditions, arbitrary imprisonment, deportation, slavery, prostitution, the selling of women and children; as well as disgraceful working conditions, where people are treated as mere instruments of gain rather than as free and responsible persons;** all these things and others like them are infamies indeed. They poison human society, and they do more harm to those who practice them than to those who suffer from the injury. Moreover, they are a supreme dishonor to the Creator.”

...in the World.

Bobby Jindal, Governor of Louisiana, shows the impact **one pro-life governor** can have. Just days ago, Governor Jindal signed four bills into law that will crack down on **human trafficking** in Louisiana. The new laws are intended to help ensure criminals are prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law and that victims of human trafficking are identified and protected.

The Governor said human trafficking occurs when a person is forced to provide commercial services against his or her will, often, but not always, related to sex – and it is occurring at alarming rates in Louisiana. The Governor said these new laws will further punish criminals in order to deter participation in this terrible industry, as well as provide victims more protection and a way out. The new laws are called a model for other states by anti-trafficking organizations.

But Governor Jindal, earlier this month, also used the **power of the veto** to support a culture of life. Saying he had concerns about how “legislation impacts the way we value human life,” Governor Jindal, for the second time in as many years, vetoed a bill that would have made it legal to enter into a contract with a **surrogate mother** in Louisiana. Both vetoes took place **despite enormous support in the state legislature**. In a letter, the Louisiana Bishops’ Conference had said that “surrogacy arrangements commercialize and objectify women relegating them to a utilitarian purpose. The Congregation for the Doctrine of Faith spoke to this point...(when) it stated that surrogacy is contrary to the dignity of persons.”

Holy Rosary Tuition Assistance

The Diocese of Cleveland encourages parishes who do not operate a Catholic School to provide assistance for children whose families are registered at that parish to attend a Catholic grade school. This program subsidizes an amount sufficient to cover the difference between parishioner and non-parishioner tuition rates at area Catholic grade schools and allows families to remain active parishioners of their home parish. Any parish family with children enrolled in Kindergarten through 8th Grade at a Catholic elementary school, and who are not currently participating in the parish tuition assistance program, are invited to contact Father Joe Previde at the Parish Office at (216) 421-2995.
