Dear Parish Family,

“Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.” In saying this, Jesus reminds His disciples and us of the importance of perseverance in following Him with the whole of our lives. This Gospel passage, along with passages from other Gospels describing the end times, has long been used by many to make merely human predictions about the end of the world based on various occurrences. This may make for interesting conversation on late night radio talk shows, but not much more.

What really never passes away is the Word, spoken throughout the ages in Sacred Scripture and most especially in the Word Himself, Jesus. As Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI points out, “the realist is the one who recognizes in the Word of God the foundation of all things.” Yes, it is that Word through whom God made all of creation. Therefore, the entirety of our lives is founded in God who, ultimately, wants us to share in His life for all eternity.

While these Scriptures remind us of our eternal destiny, they are meant to challenge us to live with that destiny in mind in the here and now, within time. Think about the words of the Lord’s Prayer: “Our Father...thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.” We pray that we have the courage and grace to be obedient to God’s will in the here and now just as the angels and saints are perfectly obedient to that will in heaven. We are obedient when we acknowledge the Word among us and put flesh to it with our lives. We know that all merely human things – possessions, status, desires – are all passing moments. These are the things that will pass away as Jesus says. It is God’s Word that endures and God’s love, which keeps us in being.

So, how will we respond to the Word? Will we learn the lesson of the fig tree? True, right now is the time for us to bury or cover them for the upcoming winter. But, we know and have witnessed their new growth each spring. As part of God’s creation, they obey the laws of nature God established for them. We trust that eventually new life and fruit will come forth. The same is true with our lives when we allow the Word to be the foundation. God will bring forth new life and abundant fruit from us to build God’s Kingdom right now. Jesus stands at the gates of our souls, at the core of who we are. He wants to enter and be that foundation for us through His Word so that new life will sprout from us and endure.

Let us pray for one another that we allow the Word to be our foundation. Jesus’ words will not pass away. Let us not let them pass us by as we journey through life.

**What is the Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens?
What is the Rite of Welcoming?**

The Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens is for inquirers in the RCIA process who are preparing for their Baptism. They are now ready to publicly declare their intention to continue their journey towards becoming Catholics. At this Rite, they are asked to more fully embrace the Gospel message with the help of God, and are also signed with the Cross to show that they now belong to Christ, the Shepherd of souls. In this Rite, we, as parish family have the opportunity to more fully participate in and pray for those in the RCIA process. This weekend, the inquirers who are considering joining the Catholic Church will experience this Rite. By Church law, the Pope and all bishops are to pray for those who have experienced this Rite.

The Rite of Welcoming is for inquirers who have been previously baptized and are ready to publicly declare their intention to continue their journey toward full communion with the Catholic Church. At this Rite, they are asked if they are ready to listen to the apostles' instruction, gather with the worshipping community in prayer, and join the community in the love and service of others. They are signed with the Cross to show that they belong to Christ.

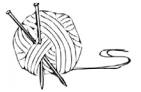

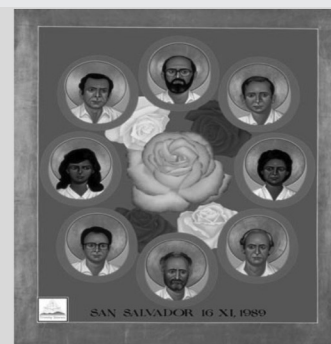
