My Dear Parish Family,

Let us continue our review of the series on The Elements of the Catholic Mass from the Liturgical Institute. The three episodes below compare those elements of the Mass that are the same and those that vary and they remind us of our role in participating. Episode 10 – Who Says Mass Is Boring?

When someone says the Mass is *boring* because it is the same thing every time, they are referring to the structure of the Mass. Yes, each Mass is the same in that we always begin, “In the name of the Father...”, followed by the penitential rite, and then the Collect and so on. This repetition is not only intentional, it serves a very good purpose which is to free us from wondering what comes next and allowing us to concentrate on praying the prayers. The repetition is like repeated exercises that produce the desired muscle memory. It allows us to concentrate on the prayers and readings and the circumstances of our lives that are different every time we come to Mass.

Episode 11 – Unity and Diversity in the Mass:

Above all else, when the faithful gather to pray the Mass, the Church calls us to manifest our unity. There is no better way to express this than to respond with the texts, postures and gestures as the Church directs us. In the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), the guidelines on how to celebrate the Mass in the U.S., it states, “We are to avoid any appearance of singularity or division.” What this means is when the Church calls us to respond, “Amen” that is what we say and not what we want to say. When we are asked by the GIRM to stand, we do not kneel. There is, however, room for legitimate diversity. You will have to watch the video to see why when in Rome, I do as the Romans do.

Episode 12 – Music Part I:

As you know, music has always played a very large part in how we celebrate the Mass at Holy Rosary. This is as it should be because music is not something that has been added on as a nice extra but we hear in the catechism that it is an integral part of the Mass. Recall that the word liturgy means the participation of the people in the activity of God. This means that when we sing at Mass, joining the sacred text with sacred music, we participate in the hymn of love that has been sung between the persons of the Blessed Trinity for time immeasurable. Listen to the prayer just prior to the Holy, Holy, Holy and recognize it as our invitation to join the song of praise that is occurring that very moment in heaven. How can we pass up that invitation?

As I asked last time, before you come to celebrate the Mass, view these three short videos and see if your celebration of the Mass next weekend is not fuller, more conscious and more prayerful.

A Tragic Anniversary, *Roe v. Wade*: The Facts

- When 1973 began, abortion was not allowed in most of the U.S. Thirty-three states, including Ohio, had specifically rejected efforts to remove legal protections for unborn children. Thirteen other states severely limited protections for unborn children and four removed all legal protection before viability (when the child can survive outside the womb, approximately 24 weeks of pregnancy).
- On January 22, 1973 (44 years ago) the U.S. Supreme Court in its *Roe v. Wade* decision, declared that pregnant women must be allowed to obtain an abortion for any reason up to the age of viability (24 weeks). States may outlaw abortion after viability, but *Roe* does not require this. *Roe* says it's legal for a state to permit abortion up to the moment of birth.
- Since *Roe*, more than 58 million abortions have occurred in the U.S.
- When *Roe* is overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court, each state will have the opportunity to decide whether or not abortion should be illegal. Eleven states (representing 20% of the U.S. population) have abortion prohibitions that could go into effect after *Roe*, but the state would have the power to decide what the law should be. The goal will always be to protect every child from abortion. (The Human Family Research Center)
